They focus on addressing any immediate crisis then connecting individuals

to the services they need.

Community Responders provide support to community members in need of assistance related to inebriation, homelessness, addiction and mental health. They respond to minor injuries or incapacitation, abandoned vehicles, non-injury accidents, needle pickups, or other

calls for service in the community.

Street Outreach and Resource Responders provide street outreach in coordination with other City departments and community-based organizations to individuals experiencing homelessness in encampments; conduct in-person assessments; and assist with screening, organizing and prioritizing reports regarding homeless encampments. This team will play no role in code enforcement regarding encampments and will focus on connecting individuals to

long-term services.
